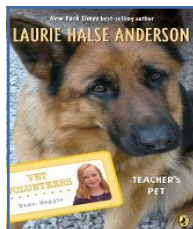


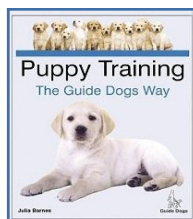
## Books About Dog Guides

Fiction for ages 8-12

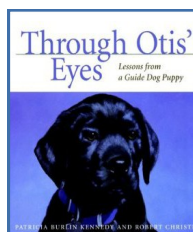

Nonfiction for all ages

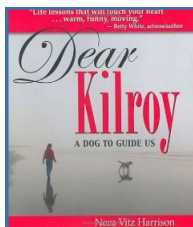

Nonfiction picture book for all ages

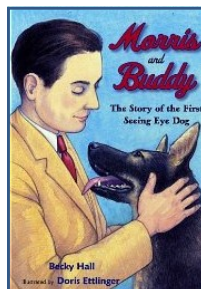

Nora Fitz Harrison, *Dear Kilroy: A Dog to Guide Us* (2003)

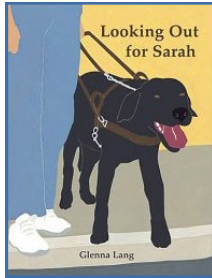
Non-fiction for adults

Glenna Hall and Doris Ettliger, *Morris and Buddy* (2007)

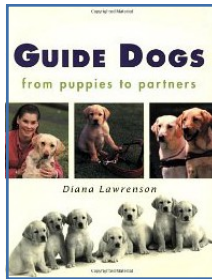
The true story of a young man, Morris Frank, who lost his sight at 24 years of age. He travels to Europe in search of independence and brings back Buddy, the first American dog guide. Morris and Buddy and instrumental in the founding of The Seeing Eye, the nation's first dog guide training school.



Glenna Lang , *Looking for Sarah* (2003)

Fiction for ages 3-8

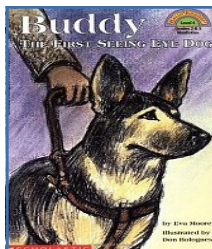
Based on a true story, this handsome picture book tells of a day in the life of a guide dog, Perry, a black Labrador retriever who looks out for his blind owner, Sarah. Every page shows the close bond between the strong, active woman and the beloved companion who helps her be independent.



Diana Lawrenson, *Guide Dogs: From Puppies to Partners* (2002)

Non-fiction for ages 8-14

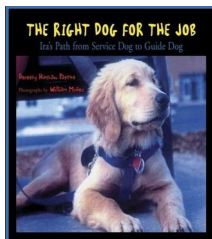
Engaging and informative, this book looks at the breeding, raising, training, and assessment of young dog guides, as well as what happens when they are matched with their handlers to become working dog guides. Also described is the history of dogs that were trained to guide blind people from as far back as the early 1800s.



Eva Moore, *Buddy: The First Seeing Eye Dog* (1996)

Nonfiction for ages 8-12

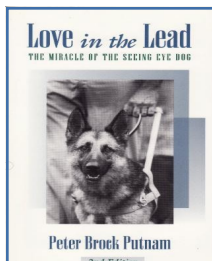
Buddy, a German Shepherd, was the first guide dog in the U.S. Her partner, Morris Frank, became blind as a young man and helped found The Seeing Eye, the first facility for dog guides in the United States.



Patent, Dorothy Hinshaw, *The Right Dog for the Job* (2004)

Nonfiction for ages 6-12

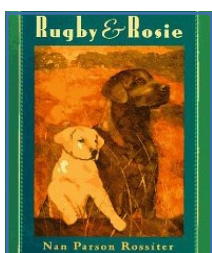
This photo-essay book tells the story of puppy Ira who goes to live with a "puppy raiser" when he is eight weeks old. After additional instruction at a specialized training center, Ira becomes a dog guide.



Putnam, Peter, *Love in the Lead* (1979, 1997)

Nonfiction for adults

A fascinating history of The Seeing Eye, the first training school for dog guides established in the U.S. The dog guide movement began in Europe; Buddy and Morris Frank were the first dog guide partnership in the U.S.



Rossiter, Nan Parson, *Rugby & Rosie* (1997)

Nonfiction for ages 6-8

A young boy and his dog, Rugby, welcome a new puppy that will live with them for a year before leaving to train as a guide dog.
